

Esperance Port Zone agricultural statistics

The Esperance Port Zone occupies about 6% of the Goldfields-Esperance region and covers about 5.4 million hectares, of which 28% is arable. Agriculture, fisheries and increasingly aquaculture are the major primary industries of the area. Agriculture is dominated by wheat and barley production, which along with canola, oats, pulses and lupins generate more than 85% of the region's annual agricultural production value of \$800 million and about one fifth of WA's total cereal production each season. Livestock (sheep, cattle and poultry) account for about 13% of the the area's annual agricultural value.




Annual broadacre crop production (five-year average 2016-20)¹

6% of WA grainbelt total








Region Comparisons

Region Trends



Population (as at 2020)

- 53,363 people in the Goldfields-Esperance region with a median age of 35.
- 15,786 (29%) of these in the Esperance Port Zone.



Employment

- 13% (1380) of employed population in Agriculture Forestry and Fisheries.
- 36% (721) of businesses in Agriculture Forestry and Fisheries.



 Annual rainfall in the Esperance Port Zone ranges from 175–225mm in the north to 450–700mm in the south. Average annual rainfall over the past 20 years has declined significantly compared to the region's 100-year average.



Crops

 The Esperance Port Zone is dominated by cereal production – wheat, barley and canola, with stable crop production from 2013–2018. Pulse crops are on the rise (from a low base) with farmers value adding by marketing and selling direct to market through the Esperance Port.



Livestock

 Livestock numbers (sheep) are declining in the Esperance Port Zone with producers on-selling animals in the past few years due to high prices and dry seasons.



Aquaculture

 Esperance has an emerging shellfish industry and an established abalone industry.
