

CREEPING BROOKWEED Samolus repens

H3 HERB



CREEPING BROOKWEED Samolus repens

Family: Primulaceae.

Description: Erect or spreading rhizomatous or stoloniferous herb with leafy stems and narrow slightly fleshy leaves to about 3 cm long (see photo). Seed capsule about 5 mm long, woody with numerous brownish rough-coated seeds (see photo). Flowers spring to autumn.

Key features: White or pale pink solitary 5-petalled flowers with petals 5–7 mm long (see photo) on stalks to 4 cm long, the flower stalks are subtended by a leaf-like bract. Stems usually warty and wrinkled. Grows initially as a rosette, then develops prostrate branches that can grow into scalded areas.

Value: Generally a minor component of saline areas. Generally not eaten by stock.

Salinity and waterlogging tolerance: High tolerance to waterlogging and salinity.

Notes: Native to many parts of the world including Australia. Locally abundant in a few inland saline areas with the local *S. eremaea*, but is widespread and common in coastal temperate saltmarsh.
